Notes to Teacher

This package of crossword puzzles contains the following components:

1. A fact sheet for use with each time period in the package. It provides students with the body of information required to complete the crossword puzzle.
2. Three different puzzles for each time period.
3. Answer keys for each puzzle.

When I use these materials with students, I give each student a copy of the fact sheet and one version of the puzzle. Some students will be able to complete the puzzle in 30-45 minutes, others will take longer. Sometimes I encourage students to work together and talk about the information they are seeking and finding – on other occasions students work alone.

Clues for multi-word puzzle answers are preceded by a note that the answer consists of more than one word. For instance: “(3 words)” at the start of a clue indicates that the answer will be three words or initials. *CanadianPacificRailway* is treated as three words as is *CPR*. Similarly, *JohnAMacdonald* is treated as three words and so is *JAM*. All provinces are treated as a single word (e.g. *BritishColumbia* is one word as is *BC*).

The puzzles are essentially self checking – if the student’s answer fits it is usually correct. When I mark the puzzles I usually scan them for completion and spot check some of the answers for clues that have given students trouble. If you use these puzzles as a weekly activity you might decide to give them the weight of a unit of study. In my classes completion of twenty puzzles formed an elective unit worth 5-10% of the student’s final mark. Such a “bonus mark” seemed to motivate!

I have found that many students who claim to dislike history will often enjoy completing history-based crossword puzzles. Students who do little “work” in class will often slave away on the puzzles and almost in spite of themselves start to see patterns in the “trivia” presented by the puzzles and their fact sheets. In many cases, even reluctant students will start to absorb information and begin to be interested in “finding out more” about our country’s history! I believe that you will find as I have that the *Events in Canadian History Crossword Puzzles* will be an entertaining and motivating way to boost your students’ learning.

Events in Canadian History

1913 – 1915

- Jan 02, 1913 Fire destroyed the Calgary meat packing plant owned by rancher Pat Burns. Damage was estimated at \$1,000,000.
- May 30, 1913 The Navy Aid Bill was defeated by the Liberal majority in the Senate.
- Jul 05, 1913 Vilhjalmur Stefansson left Seattle aboard the whaling ship Karluk to start a three year study of central Arctic coast. The scientific expedition was sponsored by the Canadian government.
- Jul 31, 1913 Alys Bryant made the first solo aircraft flight by a woman in Canada when she took off from a racetrack in Vancouver.
- Aug 06, 1913 John Bryant became the first aviator in Canada to die in a crash. It happened in Victoria, BC.
- Aug 13, 1913 Troops were dispatched to Nanaimo, BC when striking coal miners took over and looted the town, burning the homes of strike breakers and mine executives.
- Oct 03, 1913 The US eliminated its tariff on Canadian newsprint.
- Nov 07, 1913 A severe storm lashed the Great Lakes. 26 ships were sunk and 251 sailors died on Lakes Michigan and Superior. 41 ships and 194 lives were lost on Lakes Huron and Erie. Damage estimates exceeded \$100,000,000.
- Dec 08, 1913 The federal cabinet issued an Order-in-Council prohibiting both skilled and unskilled labourers from entering Canada through BC ports. BC was experiencing unemployment and labour disputes at the time.
- 1913 400,870 immigrants arrived in Canada in 1913 - a record.
- Jan 01, 1914 The Canadian Northern Railway opened its transcontinental service.
- Jan 11, 1914 The whaling ship Karluk sank in the Arctic Ocean after it had dropped explorer Vilhjalmur Stefansson off to study the western Arctic Ocean. The 22 men, one woman and two children aboard the ship managed to get to an ice floe and walk 128 km over the ice to Wrangle Island.
- Jan 28, 1914 Nellie McClung and a number of other suffragettes held a mock parliament in Winnipeg to promote women's suffrage.
- Feb 23, 1914 Canada's Supreme Court upheld the Saskatchewan law that forbade European women from working in Chinese owned businesses.
- Mar 31, 1914 The Canadian Armed Forces consisted of 3000 officers and enlisted men in the regular force. The militia included another 5615 officers and 68,991 enlisted men.
- Apr 01, 1914 A sudden blizzard and temperatures that dropped unexpectedly to -23°C trapped and killed 77 men hunting seals on ice off the coast of south-eastern Labrador. Another 173 men died when the sealing ship Southern Cross was lost at sea during the same storm.
- Apr 19, 1914 The first Grand Trunk Pacific train from Winnipeg arrived in Prince Rupert on BC's north coast.

- Apr 25, 1914 Sluice gates were opened at the Bassano Dam in Alberta. The water would be used to irrigate 600,000 hectares of land the CPR wished to sell to settlers.
- May 14, 1914 Calgary Petroleum Products Company struck oil at its "Dingman 1" well in Alberta's Turner Valley. The 822m deep discovery set off a wild oil boom.
- May 23, 1914 The ship Komagata Maru arrived at Vancouver carrying 376 Sikhs. Even though they were British subjects they were not allowed to land.
- May 29, 1914 The Norwegian coal carrier Storstad collided with the Canadian Pacific's Empress of Ireland in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Only 464 of the people aboard the Empress of Ireland survived; 1012 died.
- Jun 12, 1914 Even though the House of Commons unanimously approved a Conservative resolution to increase the number of western Senators, the Senate refused to pass it.
- Jun 19, 1914 The Hillcrest coal mine in the Crowsnest Pass was rocked by a methane gas explosion. 189 men were killed.
- Jun 28, 1914 Archduke Ferdinand, heir to the throne of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, was assassinated in Sarajevo, Serbia.
- Jul 23, 1914 After sitting in Vancouver's harbour for two months, the Komagata Maru left with its Sikh passengers. All but 24 of them had been refused entry into Canada.
- Jul 28, 1914 Austro-Hungary declared war on Serbia.
- Jul 29, 1914 The Grand Trunk Railway, which included the Grand Trunk Pacific, merged with the Canada Atlantic Railway Company.
- Jul 30, 1914 Col. Sam Hughes, Canada's Minister of Militia, announced Canada's plans to call up 25,000 troops if Britain became involved in the looming European war.
- Aug 01, 1914 Germany declared war on Russia.
- Aug 01, 1914 Canada's government offered to send Canadian troops to support Britain. The offer was communicated through the Governor General.
- Aug 03, 1914 The Canadian government suspended the use of gold coins and authorized banks to issue paper currency. The gold would be needed to finance the impending war.
- Aug 03, 1914 Germany declared war on France.
- Aug 04, 1914 Germany launched an attack on France through Belgium.
- Aug 04, 1914 Britain declared war on Germany. This automatically brought Newfoundland and Canada into the war.
- Aug 04, 1914 BC Premier McBride bought 2 submarines from a Seattle ship yard before US neutrality rules banned the sale of military equipment. BC would later sell them to the federal government.
- Aug 06, 1914 The federal cabinet banned the export of food and military equipment to all countries except Britain, Japan, France and the US.
- Aug 06, 1914 Britain accepted Canada's offer of troops. The Borden government authorized the mobilization of militia units willing to volunteer for overseas duty.
- Aug 11, 1914 Recruiting began for the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI). This was a new regiment named after the daughter of Governor General Connaught.

- Aug 15, 1914 The US built Panama Canal was formally opened when the cargo ship Ancon passed through.
- Aug 18, 1914 Parliament met for 4 days during which it would pass the War Measures Act giving the cabinet emergency powers to help it direct Canada's war effort.
- Aug 19, 1914 Canada issued a statement that it was at war with Germany and Austria-Hungary.
- Aug 19, 1914 1098 of more than 3000 volunteers were selected for the PPCLI. Most of the men had previously served in British forces around the world.
- Sep 09, 1914 The Grand Trunk Railway commenced operations between Prince Rupert and Winnipeg.
- Sep 14, 1914 The survivors of the Karluk were rescued at Wrangle Island by the trading vessel Kins and Winge. 11 of them had died since their ship sank in the previous January.
- Sep 14, 1914 Henri Bourassa made a speech opposing Canada's participation in the European War.
- Sep 16, 1914 The Canadian Aviation Corps was formed for service in the European War.
- Oct 03, 1914 The First Canadian Contingent sailed from Quebec for England. It included 33,000 men, 7000 horses, and 144 cannons. The force filled 32 ships and was escorted by 10 British warships - which made it the largest military force to cross the Atlantic to this date.
- Oct 15, 1914 The First Canadian Contingent arrived in Plymouth, England from Quebec with 33,000 men for service in the War.
- Dec 21, 1914 The PPCLI reached France where it served as part of Britain's 80th Brigade. It was the first Canadian regiment to reach the area.
- Jan 06, 1915 The PPCLI and the British 80th Brigade moved into the front lines and combat for the first time.
- Feb 14, 1915 The 1st Canadian Division arrived in France and began moving to positions in Belgium.
- Feb 20, 1915 Explorer Vilhjalmur Stefansson traveled along the coast of Banks Island in Canada's Arctic.
- Feb 24, 1915 The 1st Canadian Division took up positions along 6.5 km of the front near the town of Armentières.
- Feb 26, 1915 Nellie McClung led a large delegation to the Alberta Legislature to demand the right for women to vote in provincial elections.
- Mar 10, 1915 Canadian troops fought in the Battle of Neuve Chapelle in the area north of La Bassee and west of Lille in north-west France.
- Mar 16, 1915 The 2nd Canadian Division started arriving in France.
- Apr 22, 1915 The Germans launched the Second Battle of Ypres in Belgium. They made use of poison gas for the first time on the Western Front.
- Apr 24, 1915 The Germans launched a second attack at Ypres using gas. Even though unprotected from the effects of the gas, Canadian troops successfully resisted the attack losing 6,055 men in the process.
- May 03, 1915 John McCrae composed the poem "In Flanders Fields" in 20 minutes during the Second Battle of Ypres.

- May 07, 1915 The War Purchasing Board was created after a scandal indicated corruption in the purchase of drugs and horses for Canada's military.
- May 07, 1915 The Cunard Line's passenger ship, Lusitania, was sunk by a German U-boat off the coast of Ireland. 1200 passengers and crew died; only 764 survived.
- May 08, 1915 The PPCLI fought in the Battle of Frezenberg Ridge where the Germans attacked behind clouds of poison gas. The PPCLI held their portion of the front even though they were under fire from three sides. When the fighting was over, the PPCLI had 154 combatants remaining - it had suffered 392 killed and wounded.
- May 11, 1915 British forces commenced a four day artillery bombardment on German positions signalling the start of the Battle of Festubert in the Ypres Salient.
- May 13, 1915 Tobias Norris formed a Liberal government in Manitoba to replace the Conservative government of Rodmond Roblin. Roblin had resigned in the face allegations of corruption.
- May 18, 1915 Troops of the 1st Canadian Division launched an unsuccessful attack on German positions during the Battle of Festubert. Their advance was stopped by German artillery fire and heavy rains.
- May 20, 1915 Allied forces renewed their attacks on German positions in the Battle of Festubert. After five days they managed to advance less than one kilometre and capture the village of Festubert. They would hold the position until the German advance in the spring of 1918.
- May 27, 1915 The British ended their assaults on German positions around Festubert after suffering 16,000 casualties including 2,468 Canadian dead. The Battle of Festubert was over.
- Jun 30, 1915 The Canadian government created a hospital commission to treat wounded veterans. It would become known as the Military Hospitals Commission in October.
- Jul 15, 1915 Leave was granted to Canadian soldiers stationed at training camps in Canada to allow them to help with the harvest.
- Jul 14, 1915 PM Borden attended a meeting of the British Cabinet. He was the first Canadian Prime Minister to do so.
- Jul 14, 1915 A Curtiss JN-3 built by Canadian Airplanes Ltd. was test flown near Toronto. It was the first Canadian manufactured airplane.
- Jul 20, 1915 Explorer Vilhjalmur Stefansson left Mercy Bay on Banks Island where Robert McClure and his crew had abandoned the Investigator in 1853. Stefansson and his party headed across the island to Cape Kellett.
- Aug 05, 1915 A three member commission was appointed to replace the Ottawa School Board. The elected board members had refused to require all teachers to be qualified to teach in English.
- Aug 1915 The government of Canada borrowed \$45,000,000 in New York to help finance the War.
- Sep 1915 The Canadian Corps was created in France and commanded by British General Edward Alderson. It consisted of the 1st Canadian Division commanded by Arthur Currie and the 2nd Canadian Division commanded by Richard Turner. Both division commanders were Canadian.
- Nov 20, 1915 Canada declared war on Turkey and Bulgaria.

- Nov 22, 1915 The government of Canada issued bonds to raise money for the war. This issue was initially set at \$50,000,000 but was raised to \$100,000,000 eight days later.
- Dec 19, 1915 Captain M.M. Bell-Irving, a Canadian member of the Royal Flying Corps' No.1 Squadron shot down a German aircraft. This was the first aerial victory by a Canadian pilot.
- Dec 23, 1915 Manitoba suffragists presented Premier Tobias Norris with a 45,000 signature petition demanding universal suffrage.
- Winter 1915 Famine struck the Caribou Inuit (who lived in what is now southern Nunavut) when the caribou and muskoxen herds abruptly declined. By 1925 only 500 of these people survived.

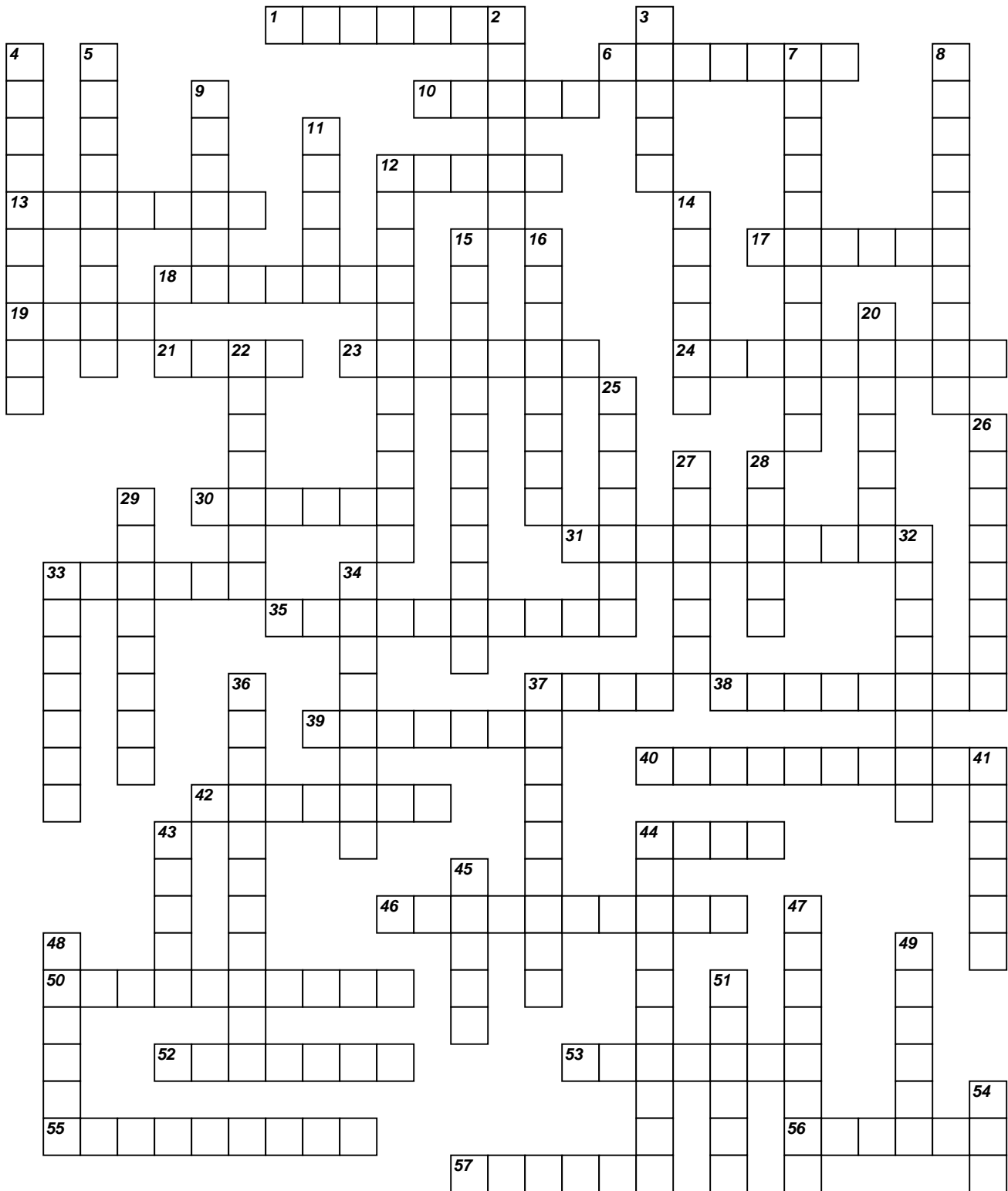
